IT & Learning Platforms

Curriculum

The school's curriculum is designed to provide a broad and balanced education that equips pupils with the knowledge, skills, and understanding necessary for success in their future lives. Through a carefully sequenced and structured approach, the curriculum enables pupils to build on prior learning and deepen their understanding over time. In addition to academic challenge, the curriculum enriches pupils' awareness of the wider world, culture, and society. It promotes the development of key skills such as critical thinking, creativity, problem-solving, and resilience within a supportive and nurturing environment that encourages positive attitudes towards learning.

Homework

Homework plays a vital role in supporting pupils' academic progress and reinforcing learning beyond the classroom. All homework tasks are published on E-Praise, and we encourage parents to regularly check in with their child and emphasise the importance of completing assignments on time.

Homework will vary across subjects and may include a combination of practical, creative, and written activities. To ensure homework is purposeful and aligned with classroom learning, the nature and format of each task is determined by the subject specialist teacher, in accordance with curriculum requirements and current topics being studied.

If your child is experiencing difficulty with any aspect of their homework, or if you have questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact the relevant subject teacher. Our staff are always happy to offer guidance and support to ensure pupils feel confident and capable in managing their workload.

In cases where a pupil is unable to attempt or complete a homework task, we kindly ask that you email the subject teacher directly to inform them.

Homework completion is monitored closely. If a pupil fails to complete a task, this will be logged. Should a pattern of missed homework emerge, parents will be notified, as repeated non-completion may begin to impact academic progress.

Form Time

Pupils attend two form time sessions each school day, designed to support both their academic and pastoral development.

- Morning Form Time takes place from 8:50am to 9:00am. During this session, form tutors take the register, share important notices, and address any immediate pastoral concerns.
- Afternoon Form Time runs from 1:30pm to 2:00pm and provides a structured opportunity for pupils to engage in a range of activities that support their personal development and wellbeing. These activities are scheduled as follows:
 - Monday: Whole-school assembly, key notices, and celebration of behaviour rewards.

- Tuesday: Numeracy Focus – pupils complete tasks designed to reinforce key mathematical concepts and skills.
- Wednesday: PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education) – pupils participate in sessions that support their holistic development and understanding of important life topics.
- Thursday: Reading Time – all pupils are expected to bring a reading book of their choice and spend the session reading, encouraging a love of literature and independent learning.
- Friday: Pupil Council – pupils have the opportunity to voice their opinions on school matters and contribute ideas for improvement, fostering leadership and active participation in school life.

Academic Support

To ensure all pupils reach their full potential, Tower College offers a range of academic support opportunities across the school.

For pupils in Years 7 to 10, lunchtime intervention sessions are available in Mathematics and Science. These sessions provide additional guidance and support for pupils who may benefit from extra help in these subjects. In some cases, pupils may be invited to attend targeted support sessions in specific areas, as identified by our subject specialist teachers. Parents will be informed if their child is selected to take part in these interventions.

For pupils in Year 11, a comprehensive support plan is in place to help them prepare for their final GCSE examinations. This includes:

- Assignment of an academic mentor to provide one-to-one support throughout the year.
- A programme of before and after school booster sessions, delivered by subject specialist teachers.
- Additional intervention sessions in Mathematics and English.
- Timetabled revision sessions to help pupils consolidate their learning and prepare effectively for exams.

These initiatives are designed to provide personalised support and ensure every pupil is fully equipped for success in their GCSEs.

Assessment

Assessment is an incredibly useful tool within education, and teachers will assess your child's progress in a variety of ways that are specific to the teaching of that subject.

Our aim as a school is to ensure that every pupil achieves their very best. To support our pupils in achieving this, we need to collect quality data about the progress each child is making.

The school has two formal assessment points across the academic year.

- Spring Half term 1
- Summer Half term 2

The assessment week will consist of one assessment in each subject.

Teachers will mark your child's assessment and then provide detailed feedback. The mark your child is awarded, and how this reflects in terms of their progress, will be reported to you.

Assessments provide pupils with the opportunity to:

- Identify any misconceptions they may have
- Identify topics or areas of learning where they need to improve
- Test the revision strategies they are using to make sure they are working
- Build up confidence and resilience with sitting assessments

We would ask that you encourage your child to revise, so they are prepared to sit the assessments. Teachers will provide pupils with a revision list on E-Praise. This will give pupils several weeks to prepare for their assessments. In the weeks leading up to an Assessment Week, teachers will no longer set homework activities as pupils will be expected to use this time to revise. This will be communicated to parents via email.

We know that some pupils may have some anxiety surrounding assessments, but we would like to reassure all parents that teachers are here to provide appropriate support. Pupils will have a study skills session aimed at providing useful advice and guidance on how to revise in a form period.

School Reports

Each pupil will receive a school report at the end of every half term. These reports include two key indicators:

- Progress Indicator – reflecting how well your child is performing relative to their ability.
- Effort Grade – indicating the level of effort your child has demonstrated in their learning.

Both indicators are graded on a scale from 1 to 5, where:

- 1 = Poor
- 2 = Requires Improvement
- 3 = Satisfactory
- 4 = Good
- 5 = Excellent

We encourage parents to focus on these indicators as they provide valuable insight into your child's academic development and engagement.

Some reports may also include additional information such as written comments and assessment data, offering a more detailed overview of progress.

GCSE Options

Pupils select their GCSE options in Year 9, allowing them time to experience a broad range of subjects before making informed decisions about their academic pathway. This process is designed to support pupils in choosing subjects that align with their interests, strengths, and future aspirations.

All pupils study the following core compulsory subjects:

- Mathematics
- English Language
- English Literature
- Religious Education (RE)

In addition to these, pupils are able to select five option subjects from the remaining curriculum. During the Autumn Term, parents and pupils will have the opportunity to meet with subject teachers to discuss available options. Following these meetings, pupils will submit their initial preferences.

The school will then create option blocks based on pupil choices, with the aim of accommodating as many first-choice selections as possible. While every effort is made to ensure pupils receive all five of their preferred subjects, we cannot guarantee that all preferences will be met.

Finalised option blocks will be released by Easter, and pupils will formally choose their GCSE subjects in the Summer Term, ready to begin their courses in Year 10.

School Lunches

Tower College works in partnership with Thomas Franks to provide high-quality, nutritious meals for all pupils. The catering team accommodates a wide range of special dietary requirements, including allergies, intolerances, vegetarian diets, and religious dietary choices.

We work closely with parents, pupils, and Thomas Franks to ensure every child enjoys a well-balanced diet that supports their health and wellbeing. Pupils and parents are regularly invited to provide feedback through questionnaires, helping us continuously improve our food offering.

Lunches operate on a three-week rotating menu, offering variety and choice. Please note that pupils are not permitted to bring packed lunches, except in exceptional circumstances and only with prior approval from the Principal.

Medical and Allergies

The majority of Middle and Upper School teaching staff at Tower College are first-aid trained, ensuring that pupils are well supported in the event of a medical concern.

Pupils are not permitted to carry or self-administer over-the-counter or prescription medication unless this has been specifically authorised by Ms Gregory. School Attendance

Every day in school counts. There is a direct link between attendance and how well students are likely to perform in school.

Government research shows that:

- Students who have 5 days off school each year have a 98.5% chance of achieving 5 A* - C
- Students who have 10 days off have 57% chance of achieving 5 A* - C
- Students who have over 20 days off have 28% chance of achieving 5 A* - C

It is important that all pupils attend school and arrive on time for the start of the school day. If your child is absent this must be reported to the school office (office@towercollege.com). Requests for authorised absence should also be sent to the school office.

Please drop off your child at the Jubilee Building entrance, where members of staff will kindly greet and supervise them.

Behaviour

At Tower College, we have high expectations for the way pupils conduct themselves and present their appearance. We believe that maintaining high standards in behaviour and uniform contributes to a positive learning environment and reflects the values of our school community.

We communicate clearly with pupils and parents when expectations are not being met and ask for your support in upholding these standards. Our Behaviour Management Policy is available on the Policies page of our website.

Pupils who do not meet behaviour expectations will receive a verbal warning. Persistent failure to meet expectations or more serious incidents may result in a detention, which is held during morning break. Parents will be informed if their child is issued a detention. Where behaviour becomes a concern, additional support may be put in place, including placing the pupil on report.

Positive behaviour is recognised and rewarded through the House Points system. Pupils earn house points by demonstrating our school values, and both pupils and parents can track progress via E-Praise. Each week, during assembly, we celebrate the form group and individual pupil who have achieved the highest number of house points.

Mobile Phones

Pupils are not permitted to have or use mobile phones on school grounds. If your child requires a mobile phone for travel safety purposes to and from school, they must bring it to the main office before the start of the school day, and collect it at the end of the school day.

Pupils found to have mobile phones in school will have them confiscated and sanctions may follow in line with the behaviour management policy.

Prefects and Leadership

We are proud to offer a Prefect System that enables pupils to contribute meaningfully to the leadership and development of the school. Prefects are expected to consistently uphold the school values of Resilience, Integrity, Scholarship, and Enrichment, and to serve as exemplary role models within the school community.

The programme provides pupils with opportunities to:

- Develop leadership skills through training and mentoring
- Gain critical skills beneficial for higher education and future employment
- Participate in educational trips and visits
- Influence positive change within the school

Pupils in Years 9, 10, and 11 are eligible to apply for prefect roles. Head Prefects are selected from Year 11 pupils.

School Library

Reading is a fundamental part of personal development and plays a vital role in supporting both academic progress and emotional wellbeing. At Tower College, we actively promote a love of reading across all year groups.

Our school library is open to pupils in Years 7 to 11 during break and lunchtime, providing a welcoming space to explore a wide range of books and resources. Pupils also visit the library as part of their weekly English lessons, where they are encouraged to borrow books and engage with literature.

All library resources are selected with input from pupils through regular feedback, ensuring the collection remains relevant, engaging, and diverse. Pupils also have the opportunity to apply for the role of School Librarian, assisting with the day-to-day running of the library.

Special Projects

At Tower College, pupils are placed at the heart of everything we do. We actively encourage them to engage with a wide range of opportunities beyond the classroom, including participation in special projects that run throughout the academic year.

These projects allow pupils to contribute to the development of the school while gaining valuable real-world experience and skills. Pupils may apply to be involved and take on meaningful roles within each initiative.

Recent examples include:

- Construction Crew – pupils worked alongside architects and building contractors during school redevelopment projects.
- Fashion Design Team – pupils collaborated with a local business to design a dress and participate in a fashion show.
- Film Crew – pupils are currently working with a marketing firm to produce the school's new promotional video, taking on roles such as directing, filming, and set design.

These projects offer pupils the chance to develop leadership, creativity, and teamwork skills, while making a tangible contribution to the life and growth of Tower College.

Pupil Council

We believe in giving pupils a meaningful voice in shaping their school experience. Pupil Council runs weekly during form time, providing pupils with the opportunity to share their ideas and opinions on a range of school-related topics.

Each week, pupils are invited to discuss a specific theme or question, encouraging thoughtful dialogue and collaboration. Feedback from these discussions is reviewed by staff to ensure pupil perspectives are considered in the ongoing development of the school.
